Key Question Week 3: Who was the woman with the lamp?

Key Text for Linked Learning: Florence Nightingale (Usbourne Famous Lives) The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett

Linked Learning: English, History, PDW

In History this week the children will discover what life was like during the Crimean War, putting themselves into the shoes of Florence Nightingale, working as a nurse during these times. The children will investigate a range of primary and secondary sources to find out about the lady with the lamp and the impact she had on health care. The children will compare hospital conditions in the past to 2021 and continue this through their PDW work. The children will develop an understanding of how Florence Nightingale became an influential historical figure. In English this week, the children will be exploring a range of diary entries linked to past events e.g. during the Crimean war. They will edit and improve the language used in examples and consider the correct types of words to use for the type of text, focusing on tense as well as sentence types. The children will also identify the features of a diary through their reading lessons, extracting information during retrieval questions and using inference to infer how people were feeling during this time.

Maths: This week the children will start the week by adding two 2-digit numbers using the strategies of partitioning and counting on. They will practise using both strategies and choose their preferred method. The children will then learn two strategies to subtract two 2-digit numbers from each other; counting back and finding the difference by counting on, again selecting their preferred method. At the end of the week, the children will have different word problems to solve and will have to decide if they add or subtract and then use the strategies they have practised this week to show their working out.

Science: The children will record the growth of the bean and look at how it has developed over the last few weeks. Some of the questions children will be asked are. Can you recreate the plant with craft materials – use tissue paper and pipe cleaners to create plan and label, look for established plant to look at growth? Can you label the parts of the plant?

History: see above

Geography: Children will be learning about the characteristics of Polar and Desert climate zones and identifying the location of hot/cold areas of the world in relation to the Equator.

Computing: In Computing this week the children will look at how to recognise whether a website is appropriate for children or not and what to do if they are unsure.

Music: This week the children will record their own sounds from nature using a variety of recording pieces of software.

Art/ Design Technology: Children will be commenting on a piece of art by Andy Goldsworthy, describing how it makes them feel and how the artist might have been feeling by examining the use of shape, texture, and colour. They will also compare how this piece of art makes them feel in comparison to Pollock and Matisse.



Each family member has been planting seeds, watering and taking great care of their little plants. Now their plants have grown they can enjoy juicy, red tomatoes.


The family took photos each week and measured the height of their plants as they grew.





Andy Goldsworthy - Art in Nature



What?

Filling shapes with found materials to form attractive geometric artworks.

How?

Choose a shape that relates to an existing classroom topic or a maths shape. Get the pupils to mark this out on a large surface like the floor or an outside area using some of the materials found. If limited by space you could do this on a sheet of paper on a desk. Divide the shape into smaller sections, and decide together the number and shape of these sections. Fill each of these sections with a different colour or texture from the materials brought in. Whatever is used to fill your shape should result in quite a beautiful pattern. You can photograph the result or draw it. What could you do with the photographs or drawings?

You will need

 Materials found in the school playground, pupils' gardens, in the park or on the walk to school. These might be leaves, berries, gravel, litter, wire, papers or wrappers.

Variations

- By focusing on any one of the above questions at the beginning of the activity pupils may choose to respond to the challenge in a different way.
- You could choose a shape found in the school building like a window, then make a large picture of the school using the filled shapes as the windows.

Difficulty rating

Easy. Simple materials and no special techniques required, but can be made more challenging by adding constraints (e.g. only natural objects, only red objects) or linking the activity to maths.
