





- Perform your poem and ask a friend to record you on the ipad.




What are rhyming words?



Thursday 21st October

L.O. To recognise a rhyming couplet

There are lots of different types of poems.

Some of them rhyme and some don't. Today we are continuing to learn about rhyming poems but a very special kind of rhyming poem, called a rhyming couplet.

A rhyming couplet is a poem where the rhyming words appear at the end of two lines.

Can you spot the rhyming words?

Twinkle, twinkle, little bat! How I wonder what you're at! Up above the world you fly, like a tea-tray in the sky.

Where do they appear?

Twinkle, twinkle, little bat! How I wonder what you're at! All night long you swoop and glide like a Frisbee, flat and wide.

Can you see a pattern?

Twinkle, twinkle, little bat!
How I wonder what you're at!
When the dawn breaks, home is best hanging upside-down to rest.

Twinkle, twinkle, little bat! How I wonder what you're at! Up above the world you fly, like a tea-tray in the sky. Can you spot them hidden in this poem? Do they follow the same pattern?

<u>History</u> - comparing objects of daily life from the past 'then' and now. They will be discussing how these objects have changed by looking at the materials, designs and the technology used.


