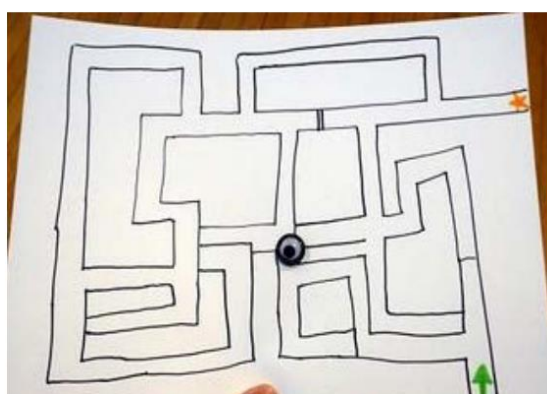
Magnetic Game ideas

Make a fishing game by tying magnets onto string. Cut out fish and either staple them or pop a paper clip onto them to make them stick to the fishing rod magnet.



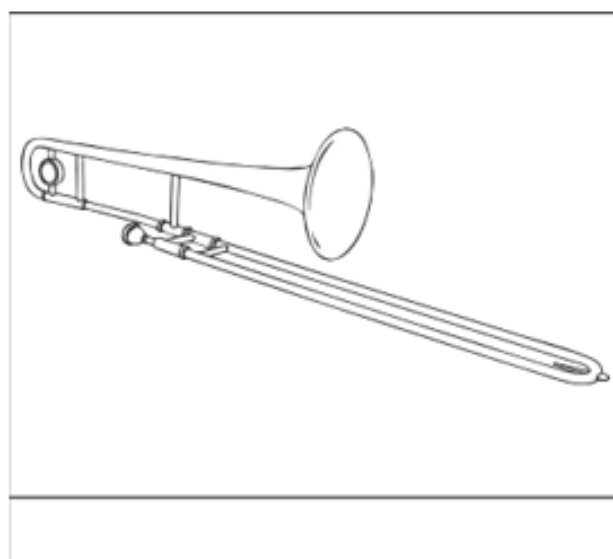
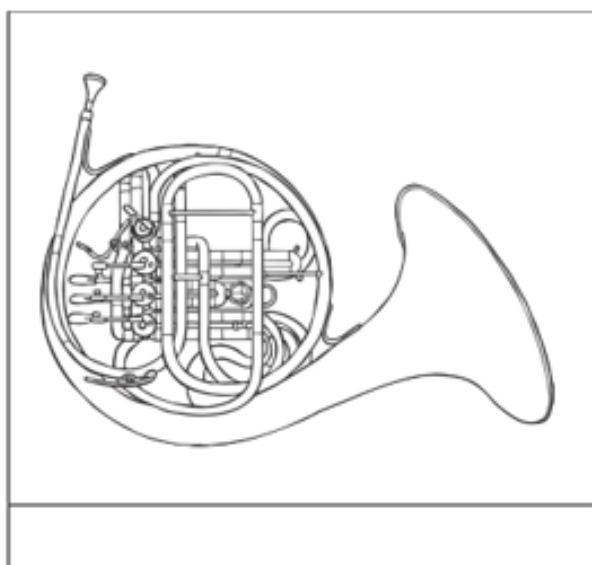
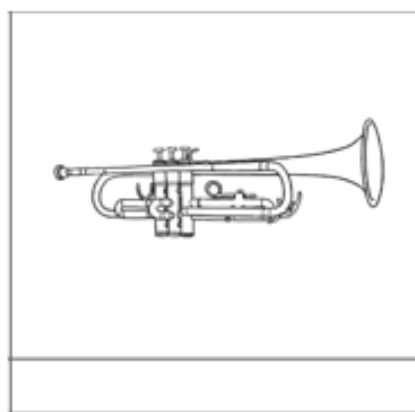
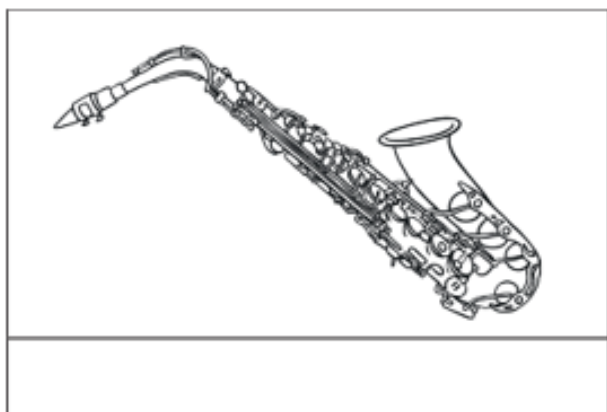
