Instructions

Place a ruler on the side of the bottle and mark in cm up the side using the permanent pen.


Bury the bottle outside, it should be in an open area away from trees which might trap some of the rain. Leave the top sticking out.

Thursday History

How did the Anglo-Saxons live?

- The Anglo-Saxon way of life could not have been more different from that of the Romans.
- In place of well-laid out towns of stone buildings, the Anglo-Saxons lived in small village settlements • They kept sheep, cattle and pigs for food and of round daub (mud cement) and wottle (woven branches) huts.
- When they first arrived in England, they followed the river valleys in their boats and built their villages on the banks.
- As they moved further inland, they began to clear woodlands and build further settlements.
- They avoided the Roman towns and cities, which fell into ruin. They were suspicious that they had been built by giants and were haunted by ghosts.
- Anglo-Saxon villages were surrounded by two or three large open fields.
- The fields were divided into narrow strips and each family received a number of strips to farm.
- Each year one field was left without any crops growing on it so that the soil could recover.
- Anglo-Saxons women could own their own land and were in charge of the household servants.
- They enjoyed many freedoms but were never considered to be equal to men.
- Life was very harsh.
- It was difficult to keep clean, although thre
- Anglo-Saxons made their own soap from a mixture of ashes, animal fat and urine.

How did the Anglo-Saxons live?

- In their farming communities, the Anglo-Saxons grew wheat for bread and barely for beer, peas and beans.

- They mainly drank beer, although the richer people drank wine which had to be brought into the country from France and Italy.
- Mead, a drink made from honey, was also popular. Even though Anglo-Saxons lived in simple huts, they were skilled workers.
- They made the finest weapons and armour and the most beautiful and intricate jewellery.
- The Anglo-Saxons did not know disease could spread and they relied on cures and rememdies.
- For toothache, it was suggested that the sufferer boil a holly leaf, put it in a bowl of water, raise the bowl to their mouth and
- It was believed that the worms said to cause the toothache would come tumbling out using this method.
- It was rare for people to live past their midforties because of disease and injury.
