
Music: Samba music


Samba is Brazil's most well-known musical form and most widely played kind of Brazilian music. Samba bands are made up of many sections of different percussion instruments, which all have different, repetitive rhythms to play.

Listen to examples of the different Samba Instruments and performances online.

It can be very tricky to play a fast rhythm over and over — a good tip to help keep in time is to use a word phrase.

Try clapping or speaking the rhythms as the instruments play. Then, try splitting in half and clapping or speaking the two different rhythms at the same time!





When all the players in a samba band have practised their rhythms, it's time for a performance! Everyone plays their rhythms together, and this is called the 'main groove'.

If you are feeling extra creative, compose your own new Samba rhythms!







Equator

- The equator is an imaginary line that divides the Earth in half.
- The equator is an equal distance between the North and South Poles.
- The weather on the equator is hot all year round.
- At the equator, day and night are both 12 hours long.



Did You Know?

Although the weather is generally hot, there is a mountain on the equator where you can ski!



T Why is it called Good Friday?

The name may be derived from 'God's Friday' in the same way that good-bye is derived from 'God be with ye'.

It is 'good' because the barrier of sin was broken.



T What happens on Good Friday today?

Since the early nineteenth century, before the introduction of bank holidays, Good Friday and Christmas Day were the only two days of leisure which were almost universally granted to working people. Good Friday today is still a public holiday in much of the UK. This means that many businesses are closed.

Some Christians fast (go without food) on Good Friday. This helps them remember the sacrifice Jesus made for them on the day of crucifixion.

Procession

Some Christians take part in a procession of witness, carrying a cross through the streets and then into church.

Special Church Service

Many churches hold a special service. This may be a communion service in the evening or a time of prayer during the day, especially around 3 o'clock as that is about the time of day when Jesus died.

Many Churches hold services lasting three hours. They may celebrate the Stations of the Cross, or take part in Passion plays and dramatic

Churches are not decorated on Good Friday. In some churches, pictures and statues are covered over. It is seen as a time of mourning.




Traditional Food

It is traditional to eat warm 'hot cross buns' on Good Friday. Hot Cross Buns with their combination of spicy, sweet and fruity flavours have long been an Easter tradition.

Why do we eat Hot Cross Buns?

The pastry cross on top of the buns symbolises and reminds Christians of the cross that Jesus was killed on.



The buns were traditionally eaten at breakfast time, hot from the oven. They were once sold by street vendors who sang a little song about them.
