Dear Prime Minister,

My name is Mrs Kaur and I am a teacher at Hill West Primary School. I am writing this letter to convince you to help the citizens of Africa access clean water. Many people are dying and getting ill due to contamination. We need to help the children and stop this from happening. Below, are three reasons why I think you should consider supporting this cause. You can stop this from happening!

Firstly, 1.4 million people do not have access to clean water that is one third of the total population of Africa. I strongly believe, that this should not be happening. Everyone should have the right to drink clean water and to not get ill due to bacteria and contamination. Why is this happening?

Secondly, it is certain that you believe that education very important for all children. Many young, innocent children have to walk miles and miles to collect water. The children do not have shoes, therefore their feet are bruised, blistered and cut from the walking. It is not fair that they have to suffer like this. It takes them hours and hours to collect the water and therefore they cannot attend school. Do you think this is right?

Finally, you might not know this terrible fact but the water accessed by villagers is inhabited by insects and bacteria. This dirty, dreadful water is used by adults and young, thirsty children to wash, drink and to prepare food. The bacteria is causing major illness and resulting in death! 


